This morning brings no news of any decisive alteration in the Russian crisis. The Government and the leaders of the people still remain face to face—the former so far conscious of their weakness as to shrink from any active effort to reasser their authority; the latter so far conscious o' their strength that in St. Petersburg and Moscow they have been able to restrain any outburst of disorder. In the meantime the internal state of Russia presents an extraordinary picture. Cities in darkness, closed shops and deserted factories the almost entire stoppage of means of communication, and everywhere the massing of all available troops, form the outward and visible signs of the crisis. A telephone strike in St. Petersburg seems to have cut off the capital from Moscow and thus completed the isolation between the two chief cities of the Empire The growing inability of the Government make itself felt is bearing its natural fruits in the provinces. From not a few centres comes news of the formation of committees of public safety, or of the assumption of authority in some shape or other by the self-constituted representatives of the people.
